National Curriculum KS1

- master basic movements including running, jumping, throwing and catching, as well as
- developing balance, agility and co-ordination, and begin to apply these in a range of activities.
- participate in team games, developing simple tactics for attacking and defending
- perform dances using simple movement patterns.

National Curriculum KS2

- use running, jumping, throwing and catching in isolation and in combination
 - play competitive games, modified where appropriate [for example, badminton, basketball, cricket, football, hockey, netball, rounders and tennis], and apply basic principles suitable for attacking and defending
 - develop flexibility, strength, technique, control and balance [for example, through athletics and gymnastics]
 - perform dances using a range of movement patterns
 - take part in outdoor and adventurous activity challenges both individually and within a team
 - compare their performances with previous ones and demonstrate improvement to achieve their personal best.

Swimming and water safety

All schools must provide swimming instruction either in key stage 1 or key stage 2. In particular, pupils should be taught to:

1. swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres
2. use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke and breaststroke]
3. perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations.

Receive high-quality PE delivery 1 session per week for each class. Build staff confidence in delivering PE and using local area facilities to full potential. Monitor Commando Joe's to ensure it remains a school priority in line with our character education curriculum. PE CPD took place in September, January, April and July. These were whole staff Commando Joe's sessions and a lawn bowls CPD with the New Delval Knights. Pupil voice was carried out with pupils, staff and NUF coach regarding Commando Joe's delivery. Additional CPD was attended on the latest addition of the Commando Joe's program. This will impact on PE during the 2026/2027 academic year. Staff were exposed to a range of external coaches who helped deliver high-quality PE in new activities and sports. Staff observed and supported through these half-termly blocks. All teaching staff and some support staff attended the New Delaval Knights Lawn Bowls CPD. This provided a clear progression from our indoor Bowls Buddy PE delivery within the curriculum and an opportunity to strength community links within Newsham.

Including external coaches to be utilised alongside staff to support CPD. - Maintain partnership with new Delaval Knights junior club and promote participation and take up in this local opportunity. - Arrange a parent/carer & pupil fun bowls taster session to promote the local opportunities and raise the profile of the junior New Delaval Knights club. - Continue out-of-school competitions through Newcastle Eagles, Northumberland Cricket and NUF. - Reach out to local primary school in area to establish some regular competitive sporting opportunities across a range of year groups. - Host an internal multi-skills festival ran through our sports leaders for our EYFS & KS1 classes to build level of competition and experience for our sport leaders in Y5 & Y6. - Host internal sports competitions at lunchtimes through summer term led by PE lead with the aim for pupils to enter a team into a competitive league ran across their Key Stage. - Continue school football team 7 a-side football league and Cup competition. - Explore more accessible ways to engage with Blyth School Sports Partnership to increase the number of competitions entered. Strong partnership with the New Delaval Knights ensured a range of pupils from Year 4, Year 5 and Year 6 to receive high-quality Bowls coaching and the opportunity to compete on the Lawn Bowls facility at the local pavilion. Attended the Year 5 and Year 6 Hoops4Health annual tournament at the Vertu Arena. Attended the end of year attendance treat at the NUCASTLE facility to compete on the rooftop pitch and use the immersive gaming room. Our Year 5 & 6 football team played against Newsham Primary in the Autumn term and a Year 6 basketball tournament was arranged but was unable to go ahead due to weather conditions. Sports leaders held half-termly personal challenge weeks to provide active break times for all pupils from Year 1 to Year 6. PE lead held a Year 6 basketball tournament, Year 3, 4 & 6 indoor bowls competition and a Year 5 tennis tournament across this academic year.

During Walk To School Week, we purchased 2x scooters and helmets as raffle prizes for those pupils who recorded an active journey every day during that week. Dr Bike delivered curriculum sessions on active lessons and geography mapping alongside the half-termly local area cycle rides with a range of our Year 6 pupils. Sports leaders attended 2x CPD sessions with our Blyth School Games Organiser and delivered 4 personal challenge weeks throughout the year. Enabling pupils to be more active and focused on beating their personal best scores. Callum Deboys delivered an inspiring SportsforChampions morning across our whole school.
