New Delaval Primary School Attendance Update

Our attendance since we returned from the February half break is 94.8 %, the school target is 96%.

Whole school attendance since September is now **94.2%**. This is **positive**, but our target for attendance is **96%** and we are still a long way from that target. National average attendance is **94.6%**.

Every day we share our attendance information with the Department for Education. We can compare our attendance to other schools in Northumberland and nationally. Compared to other Northumberland schools, we are ranked 103 out of 127. Compared to other schools nationally, we are ranked in the 8th decile, which is the bottom 20 to 30%.

Children who have attendance lower than 90% are known as **persistent absentees**. Having 90% attendance is the equivalent of missing one afternoon a week every week. Currently we have 19% of our children with less than 90% attendance. That means that 33 children have missed the equivalent of one afternoon a week every week. Compared to other schools nationally, we are ranked in the 8th decile, which is the bottom 20 to 30%. **This is really worrying**.

We know that children can be genuinely unwell and therefore should not be at school. If you're not sure about whether to send your child in to school or not, the NHS website is usually a good source of information. If your child is brought to school and we feel they need to go home, we will ring you. Medicine can be administered by staff. Please call into the school office to complete a medical form. Regular school attendance is so very important.

It is no coincidence that children who miss school often do not go on to achieve their potential.
